More about the Joint Meeting: The Blues Archive and Greg Johnson

The Blues Archive at the University of Mississippi acquires and conserves blues and blues-related materials in a variety of formats for scholars of the blues, African-American studies, and southern culture. With over 50,000 sound recordings, in most audio formats; over 15,000 photographs; more than 350 videotapes; over 3,000 books, periodicals, and newsletters; and numerous manuscripts and ephemera, the Blues Archive houses one of the largest collections of blues recordings, publications, and memorabilia in the world. Important collections include B.B. King's personal record collection, the Jim O'Neal and Amy van Singel / Living Blues Collection, the Trumpet Records Collection, the John Richbourg Collection, and the Percy Mayfield Collection.

Greg Johnson is curator of the Blues Archive in the Department of Archives and Special Collections at the University of Mississippi and is serving as the vice-president of the Society of Mississippi Archivists. He was consulting editor of *Encyclopedia of the Blues* (Routledge 2006). Greg holds an Association of the Arts (music) from Meridian Community College, and Bachelor of Music and Master of Library Information Science degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi. He and his wife, Dasha, perform traditional Irish music.



More about the Joint Meeting: Jim Johnson, Recipient of the 2007 MALC Award for Excellence

Dr. Jim Johnson's 32-year career demonstrated both his dedication and his commitment to public libraries, as well as his lifelong love of teaching. Combined with his charming personality of never meeting a stranger, wonderful sense of humor, and self-proclaimed "country boy" Arkansas heritage, he brought professionalism, expertise, and quality customer service to his love of history and public library services. Dr. Johnson thrived in highly professional and academic environments, as evidenced by his undergraduate and Masters degrees in History, his Ph.D. in History and Political Science from Texas Tech, and his M.L.S. from the University of Illinois. Yet, he also relished the opportunity to share his knowledge and the resources in his charge with students doing assignments, history buffs, and budding genealogists. Although he recently retired, his influence continues, as he serves as a leading lecturer and genealogy workshop presenter and as an instructor for the University of Memphis.

(I do have to get used to driving distances down south, where my new colleagues tell me they drive to Oklahoma to take in a museum, or to Dallas, for some event, and then come home. (You realize that you can drive the length of RI in half an hour and Massachusetts in about two hours.)

In any case, I should very much like to meet any of you who are going to Denver when you are the convention for lunch or dinner or at some vendor's venue.

I will be going with my significant other, Christine Soutter (Harvard PhD. candidate grandmother....we live together on the Harvard Campus where she is a Proctor of a Freshman dorm) but she mixes pretty well with us library types, and gives me ample freedom to go wild on my own, even with the likes of the SciTech or Biomedical Sciences Division crowds as well."

Sharon Tabachnick: Sharon is currently the Instructional Services Coordinator at the University of Memphis Libraries. She received her M.S.L.S. in Library and Information Management from the University of Southern California, and her Ph.D. in Instructional Psychology and Technology from the University of Oklahoma. She has worked in a number of academic, public, and special libraries in the United States. She is also a certified teacher, and has taught elementary, high school, and college classes in the United States and abroad. One of the things that she is most proud of is her fluency in three languages: Romanian, Hebrew, and English. Special librarians needing help with any of these

languages are welcome to ask Sharon for help. Just in case you think that you are unlikely to need help with the Romanian language, for example, please read on. Back in the 1990's when Sharon was working as a librarian in Norman, Oklahoma, she received an S.O.S. call from an engineering firm in town. Evidently, the Romanian government contracted with this Oklahoma firm to carry out some engineering projects in Romania. The problem was that a Romanian government delegation was to arrive in Norman shortly, and it was next to impossible to find a professional translator at such short notice. For the first (and only) time in her life, Sharon was asked to name her price – a powerful experience for someone who has worked mostly in the non-profit sector. The story has a good ending: Sharon's extemporaneous translations enabled the Romanians and Americans to understand each other, and to sign a mutually-agreeable business contract.

Sharon is a movie lover, and enjoys film as an expressive art form. She also enjoys classical and popular music, with composers and performers such as Mozart, Chopin, and Elvis at the very top of the list. She reads mostly non-fiction books about educational and historical topics, and is forced to keep in shape by her two terrier dogs who insist on going out for long walks every single day of the week, regardless of the weather. Since moving to Memphis in 2000, Sharon has explored many interesting Southern historical sites. Most recently, she was awed by the U.S.S. Cairo, a real ironclad gunboat from the Civil War era salvaged from the muddy Yazoo River, on display at the Vicksburg National Military Park in Vicksburg, Mississippi. Sharon and her husband, Steve, have three children, the youngest of whom is getting ready to start college next fall. Having a college-bound child for the third time has sensitized Sharon again to the specific needs of college freshmen, and she intends to use this knowledge in order to improve instructional services for freshmen (and others) at the University of Memphis.

The Center-sponsored Memphis Music and Heritage Festival is held every Labor Day weekend, September 1-2, this year.

The Center includes the Folklore Store, featuring regional books, recordings and art works; the Performance Hall, where jazz, blues, rockabilly, soul, and gospel concerts are held; a Gallery for folk art and photography exhibits; a media area for viewing the many videos about the region; and the multimedia Archives.

The Center for Southern Folklore is located in downtown Memphis, 119 South Main, and is open 11a.m.-6 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

The **Majestic Grille**, at 145 South Main, represents another spot of Memphis' history. Originally built in 1913, it was the Majestic #1 Theatre, and the building featured stained glass and marble ticket booths. The rooftop sculpture remains. During its history, the building has been home to the Julius Lewis Men's Store, different restaurants, and a microbrewery.

Now the Majestic Grille is a 1940s-style bar, featuring steak, seafood, and flatbreads. Among the specialties are Grilled Chicken Carbonara, Four Cheese Ravioli, and Roasted Mahi-Mahi. A variety of hand-made, thin-crust pizzas are also available.

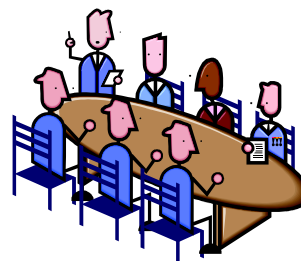
